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Introduction

As we enter this season of Lent, I hope these resources may help in your journey through Lent, as we draw closer to the presence of Christ, especially in these difficult days. Beginning on Ash Wednesday, Lent is a season of 40 days offering space for deeper reflection, a turning and re-turning to God, penitence, forgiveness, and preparation for life ahead. On Ash Wednesday you can join our simple midday Ash Wednesday service via St Mary's Youtube channel this year (12 noon or anytime later). During that service, or in your own time, we are invited to mark a sign of the cross on our forehead or hand. This year we have to do this for ourselves, which brings its own deep meaning perhaps. As Lent begins, gather some ash/dust/mud that you have prepared in advance (burning last year's palm cross to form ash, then mixing with a little olive oil, is traditional), and begin your lenten journey with your cross and the words that guide us in this season 'Remember you are dust and to dust you shall return, turn away from sin and be faithful to Christ'.

With this booklet (or on request) you will find two tangible gifts in case these help carry and encourage you in your daily rhythm of prayer and life with the cross. A bundle of 5 colourful cards to write on to form your personal pocket prayer 'breviary' (see p3), pausing in a new rhythm through the day. You could even combine with praying the liturgies of 'hours' of Lauds, Terce, Sext, Vespers, Compline included on page 20-28 too, sharing in the same prayers with Christians across the world. Also included, a branch from St Mary's Christmas tree for you to make your own small cross to carry/focus through Lent and Holy Week (p4).

On p17 you will find the order of service for our 5 Sundays of Lent. Please join via zoom for informal *St Mary's Church at Home* worship together - via the zoom link on weekly E-newsletter or email. Hope and pray we may be able to offer safely inperson worship again at Easter, with the great Easter feast celebration of new life. Also continuing online through Lent: Monday Morning Prayer 9am Facebook (& other mornings); Tuesday Prayer Vigil or Compline 6pm Facebook; Wednesday Simply Holy Communion 12noon Youtube; Thursday Sunrise St Mary's Zoom Worship 3.30pm. Please know that the church is praying together always with you here in the parish and across the world, and we join together in this wider community of prayer.

I hope and pray these resources will be of some value to you, and that we may all find deeper daily rhythms of prayer, worship, and life with God and with each other, this lenten season and for our lives beyond.

CREATIVE WAYS TO PRAY

Your Daily Prayer Breviary

A breviary (short book of hours) is a way to pray at intervals during the day & night: 'praying the hours'. A beautiful way to draw our attention back to God by pausing, giving thanks, being present in the moment. The traditional 8 monastic hours are the 5 suggested for you below plus Prime (the first hour after sunrise c.7am), None (below), and Vigils (rising for prayer during the night, c2am). Choose 5 of the 8 hours which might fit with your daily patterns through Lent. You'll also find in this booklet a short service or liturgy which you can use with each of the hours in your daily pattern of prayers through Lent/life!

* Take your 5 painted paper strips and write a prayer or psalm/scripture on the reverse (or on separate card/paper strips and stick on to reverse). You could follow traditional themes listed below; write a verse from psalm or choose any other words.

* Thread a piece of ribbon/thread through all the strips, thread the bead to sit at the ends of the ribbon you knot together.

* You could keep your breviary in your pocket through Lent, inviting you to stop briefly and pray the prayer at each particular time of day.

Your Cross from the Tree



You should have received with this resource a branch of the large Christmas tree in St Mary's Church as we celebrated the incarnation, Christ born like us, God with us. As we now turn towards Holy Week and Christ's passion/suffering and crucifixion, we're invited to take up our own cross as we reflect through Lent and know God with us through all suffering, separations, pain, through and beyond death.

Craft your own cross from your Christmas tree branch, to keep with you through Lent and Holy Week. Simply bind with twine where two lengths join.

More Ways to Prayer

- * Lighting a candle and sitting quietly before you pray can help you focus and listen.
- * Jesus taught us the *Lord's Prayer* so that we would always have words to say. Pray it slowly, it is the prayer that has all the words we need.
- * The 'Jesus Prayer' from the Orthodox tradition, 'Lord Jesus Christ, son of the Living God / have mercy on me a sinner' repeated quietly for a period of time. Begin breathing in, pause at the /, complete breathing out.
- * The "Examen" is a beautiful Ignatian way to prayerfully end and review your day with God, in five steps
 - 1. Become aware of God's presence, ask God to help you as you..
 - 2. Review the day with gratitude (as best you can)
 - 3. Pay attention to your emotions, & where you sensed God.
 - 4. Choose one feature of the day and pray with God about it.
 - 5. Look toward tomorrow, ask God to remind you he's with you

40 ACTS OF KINDNESS

40acts is the generosity challenge for Lent, created by UK Christian charity, Stewardship. For ten years, 40acts has asked a question: what if Lent could be about more than just giving stuff up? What if it could be a time of radical generosity as well as spiritual discipline? 40acts is a simple idea to commit to 40 days of giving out – to put others before ourselves and to walk in the footsteps of Jesus and follow his call to love our neighbours. FASTING & FOCUS

Lent can function as a life-changing invitation to a spiritual or physical discipline. One way is through fasting (one day a week, or one meal, or just that teatime snack), or small acts of abstinence or sacrifice (chocolate being the most famous!).

Something that is a reminder, a prompt, something of a stripping back to a simplicity of life which helps us focus, re-turn, repent, and create space to be filled afresh in God's forgiveness, grace, and new life as we look to Easter life.

So, perhaps it's not so much 'giving up', as 'giving space' for life. Seeking to understand Christ's sacrifice and resurrection in our lives.

REFLECTING WEEKLY THROUGH LENT TOGETHER

BEING DISCIPLES - St Mary's Lent Reflections Focus

'Williams invites us into a way of life that is profoundly attentive, generously forgiving and always drawn to service and joy'

These quotes from Rowan Williams' 'Being Disciples' and 'Candles in the Dark', these questions to ponder, and images for wonder, form part of the resources we'll draw on in our St Mary's Lent Small Fellowship Groups this year via zoom. If you would still like to join a Lent group any time please contact Rev Sarah. Whether you can join the groups or not, I hope the following reflections enable you to ponder and pray with these weekly prompts from wherever you are as we journey together.



1st Week of Lent: beginning 22nd Feb

Being Disciples

Scripture to dwell: John 1:36-39

From 'Being Disciples': Discipleship is about how we live; not just the decisions we make or the things we believe, but a state of being... Disciples are expectant in the sense that they take it for

granted that there is always something about to break through from the Master, the Teacher, something about to burst through the ordinary and uncover a new light on the landscape... You are hanging around; you are watching; you are absorbing a way of being that you are starting to share... You learn by sharing life; you learn by looking and listening. Being with the God is recognising that who you are is finally going to be determined by your relationship with him... Love God less and you love everyone and everything less... Discipleship isn't about choosing our company, but choosing the company of Jesus and the company he keeps... A disciple is ultimately learning how to be a place in the world where the act of God can come alive.

From 'Candles in the Dark': As a national community (in this pandemic), we have taken on board the need to act so as to safeguard the most vulnerable; learned afresh to recognise the role of those who quietly keep the common life going; become more aware of the realities of hidden privation, emotional strain, acute loneliness, to be alert to abuse behind closed doors. We haven't retreated into little individual bunkers.. Auden wrote that it was easy enough to say 'I will love you forever'; the difficult thing was to say 'I will love you at 4.15 next Thursday'. How do we go on loving, making the love real, in every moment when moods and circumstances change?

Questions to ponder:

What does it mean to you to be a disciple?
What does it mean to you to 'live in Christ's company'?
What new habits have you formed through this pandemic?
Where have you seen extraordinariness in the daily rhythm of life in pandemic?

2nd Week of Lent: beginning 1st March Faith, Hope and Love Scripture to dwell: 1 Corinthians 13:8-13

From 'Being Disciples': To grow as a disciple is to take the journey from understanding into faith, from memory into hope, and from will into love...

In confusion and loss where our understanding is concerned, faith grows in its true meaning, appears as dependable relationship... You learn somehow to be confident in a presence, an 'other, who does not change or go away, does not let you go.....

As Christians we need to point quite simply to the God who does not let go, to the Christ who does not run away... Hope like faith is hope in relation; relation to a reality that knows and sees and holds who we are and have been... Love: not simply as doing good but as a deep contemplative regard for the world, for human beings and for God... Love is generated by being loved. It is not that we love God, but that he loves us (1 John 4:10). The dependable presence that doesn't go away.



From 'Candles in the Dark': The great question, when we emerge from the shadow of the pandemic, will be: what have we learned? Our dependence on one another? Our shared failures and insecurities? Trust that we can face the truth without being destroyed? Hope that the crisis is not the last word about what's possible for human beings? Love, the full hearted will for the well-being of the entire world we inhabit.

Questions to ponder:

In the crises of identity/continuity we live through, 'Am I the same person as I was?' Is the church an environment in which people can open themselves to joy, a place that is dependable, patient, still, quiet, where we can find God?

3rd Week of Lent: beginning 8th March

Forgiveness

Scripture to dwell: Matthew 7:7-9

From 'Being Disciples': We feed each other by honouring the truth of the divine image in each other... Part of the nourishment we need is knowing that our sisters and brothers see and hear our needs as they are, not as others imagine them to be.... The person who asks forgiveness has renounced the privilege of being right or safe; she has acknowledge that she is hungry for healing, for the bread of acceptance and restoration to relationship. But equally the person who forgives has renounced the safety of being locked into the position of the offended victim; she has decided to take the risk of creating afresh a relationship known to be capable of involving hurt. Forgiveness is one of the most radical ways in which we are able to nourish one another's humanity... No power, but the powerlessness of the God whose nature is love is what is shown in the act of forgiving... The Eucharist is a sacrament of forgiveness; it is the risen Jesus returning to his unfaithful disciples to create afresh in them this communion of the new world.

From 'Candles in the Dark':Our identity as Christians is to be in the place where Jesus stands, the place from which we can see into the reality that is the outpouring of God's life... Standing with Jesus, is like standing under a waterfall: the life of God is around us, soaking, overwhelming us. We can't grab it, hold on to it, can't contain it.



Questions to ponder:

Think through an experience of profound hurt and how you have coped with it - what sort of things have made it harder or easier to manage?

Think of when you have experienced being forgiven:
how does it change the way you see yourself and others?

4th Week of Lent: beginning 15th March
Holiness

Scripture to dwell: 2 Corinthians 3:17-18; 4-6



From 'Being Disciples': One common response to talk about holy places or holy people is to run a mile!.... The way Jesus talks about holiness at the Last Suppler is transforming. Holiness is seen as going into the heart of where it's most difficult for human beings to be human... The crucifixion is in one sense the holiest event that ever happened - yet it's found outside conventional holy places, an execution machine on a rubbish dump outside the city wall... Holiness is Jesus going right into the middle of the mess and suffering of human nature... Being holy is not about being separated, but being absolutely involved... The holy person somehow enlarges your world, makes you feel more yourself, opens you up, affirms you. The landscape changes with a new light on it. A holy person makes you see things in yourself and

around you that you haven't seen before. Allows you to see not them, but the world around them. Allows you to see not them, but God... Becoming holy is being so taken over by the extraordinaries of God, that that is what you are really interested in, and that is what radiates from you to reflect on other people.

From 'Candles in the Dark': Healing and holiness come when we are gifted by Christ's Spirit to pick up the quiet hints, the shifts of movement and possibility, that will allow us to travel on together. Look at the flocks of migrating birds flying in formation and ask 'what if human communities, what if Christian communities, could learn that kind of free thinking together and acting together.

Questions to ponder:

Have you met anyone who strikes you as holy?

Can you think of yourself as someone called to be holy?

What does a holy church look like?

How might this pandemic have effected community life together

5th Week of Lent: beginning 22nd March Faith in Society & Life in the Spirit

Scriptures to dwell: 1 Corinthians 12:12-26; Galatians 5:16-22

From 'Being Disciples' Faith in Society: We are each of equal value to God, and we are all dependent on each other... The Christian vision is dynamic - everyone is engaged in building up everyone else's human life and dignity. No one's value can be measured by how successful or productive they are... There will always be something precious in us all that does not need to be proved by success, something that escapes what society expects or demands... Everyone not only has the dignity of possessing a gift and a purpose, but everyone also has the dignity of being a giver, able to give, being important to someone else... I stand before holy ground when I encounter another person. The reverence I owe to every person is connected with the reverence I owe to God, who brings them into being and keeps them in being.... In our environmental crisis, we're now more than ever in need of an attitude to a world that is not ours but is related to God before it is related to us... Being disciples means being called to see others, especially others in profound need, and our world, from the perspective of an eternal and unflinching, unalterable love.

Life in the Spirit: The fruit of the spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. Whenever we're tempted to think that spirituality is something a bit remote and specialised, or exotic and exciting in the corner of our lives, we ought just to say to ourselves: love, peace, patience....bog-standard human goodness... To sustain yourself spiritually requires some disciplines of self-awareness. Am I capable of taking my intense feelings, positive and negative, out of the depths of my guts for a moment, and putting them where I can look at them- and where Christ can look at them?.. To hear what God is saying we need a degree of stillness of body, of mind, of heart... Finding ways that settle and still us...like waves on the beach on a calm day; small words or phrases that keep us steady and hold us when everything else is pushing us around. Self-awareness and stillness, growth and joy- the building blocks of a life of discipleship that can stand up to everything around us, in the Church, the world and in ourselves.

From 'Candles in the Dark': Our churches can breath invitation... They're not just convenient buildings to have services in: they are spaces open for our discovery of God, helping us to see all space, every place as a centre for God's loving presence... Moments when we come face to face with mortality, moments like this time we're



living through, can be moments of grace- not just reminders that we must die but moments when I recognise that I don't have to make myself live forever and that the universe doesn't depend on me personally holding it together and forcing it into shape. We are the infinitely precious and diverse children of God, called to receive gifts without limit and to receive them with and for one another in the unthinkably odd community of the Church.

Questions to ponder:

How does our Christian community locally, nationally & internationally act in ways that demonstrate commitment to the dignity of every person?

How can/do we make an effective contribution to public debate?

What keeps us going as disciples?

What helps to still your mind? How can you use this to open up more space for God?



O Lord, make haste to help me.

Be still and know that I am God.

Or, in *lectio divina* way of praying, choose a short passage of scripture, and read it slowly and prayerfully letting a word or phrase come into your mind for contemplation. Read the passage again, twice, and let that word or phrase become your meditation or prayer. You could also use your prayer breviary cards for this.
