Local Elections: next May local elections will be held when all our Community Councillors as well as our Guildford BC councillors need to stand for re-election or be replaced with new candidates. We are always on the lookout for new blood to support the council from people who know about your own village and who are interested in helping to make the village a better place to live. No specific skills are needed other than a willingness to give some of your time to regular meetings and a desire to help improve where you live. If you would like to know more about the role of a Community Councillor please do get in touch with Nuala, our Clerk. Please make sure you are registered with the Guildford Borough Council Electoral Role so that you can vote in these elections.

Climate Emergency: the council continues to look at ways to be more environmentally aware and to encourage residents to be the same. The Climate Emergency Action Group has now met twice and is pulling together proposals for how it can effectively work on some of the issues locally that impact on our climate and can help to move towards Carbon Neutral status locally. The Council passed a motion on 22nd October to ensure that all aspects of our work consider the impact on Climate Change. The next meeting is scheduled for Thursday 8th December in Shalford Village Hall at 7.30pm. We plan to hold a meeting in Chilworth in the new year. Details will be posted on our website in December. Please do join us if you can to share your ideas and join the group.

Surrey CC Future Bus network Review: the county council is currently consulting on bus services in the future. This is an opportunity for all residents to make your views heard on what you want from your bus services locally. The consultation is open until 6th January 23. Shalford Pubs - The Parrot

It's a pity to see The Parrot in its present condition, deserted and dilapidated. Will it ever reopen? Monty Python jokes spring to mind. Has this Parrot really ceased to be, shuffled off this mortal coil etc? But plans have been in the pipeline for some time to refurbish and extend the premises with up-to-date indoor and outdoor seating, and bedrooms.

The Parrot first opened around 1860. It was an offshoot of Broadford Brewery, which operated there from 1843 to 1913. The brewery was then converted into a military laundry, washing army uniforms in the First World War. The site lay derelict after the laundry burned down in 1923 before being taken over as the Vulcanised Fibre Works. Many will remember the tall chimney of the fibre works beside the river. In the 1980s the site was redeveloped as Broadford Business Park.

The Parrot carried on throughout all these changes. Its meeting or assembly room was once a popular venue for cricket dinners and firms' celebrations. It often served as the location for coroner's inquests when accidental deaths occurred in Shalford, including bodies fished out of the Wey, which were taken to the pub. The meeting room was in great demand after the Village Hall in Pound Place burned down in 1961. The W.I. met at The Parrot for over three years until the new Village Hall was built.

Shalford lads would gather at the Parrot to play darts and shove ha'penny, and drink, of course. Further back in the past when quoits were a popular pub game The Parrot's quoits ground provided a venue



for matches. Until fairly recently a great bonfire for Guy Fawkes used to take place on the Common in front of the pub.

In the early nineties I often used to take my small daughter for lunch at the Parrot – they did a good children's menu. She liked it there. In fact we went so often she thought its name was actually 'Lunchparrot.' Restoring the pub and updating it for modern needs will be a massive undertaking. I hope it will revive and isn't now an ex-Parrot.

The Wey & Arun Canal Trust Find a Lost Bridge

The Trust's ownership of the canal at Birtley, south of Bramley, offers many opportunities for advancing the overall restoration. A large part of the campaign of the last 30 years has been reconnecting stretches of the waterway separated by causeways. On the Birtley reach, commencing in summer 2019, an early project was to start work on Birtley Bridge 1 which will allow the removal of a nearby causeway. We are currently engaged in building a second lift bridge. This work can be seen from the Downs Link path which runs from Shalford to Station Road in Bramley and then further south to Birtley.

Often something of the form of civil-engineering features of disused canals can be deduced by regressing through the more detailed Ordnance Survey (O.S.) maps. Unfortunately the canal was legally abandoned in July 1871 before publication of the first editions of O.S. maps at the useful scales of 6 or 25 inches to the mile, by which time many reaches of the waterway were derelict. Hence there was insufficient detail to show the type of bridge formerly at this place. One could only speculate on its shape and the slope would have been difficult to accommodate the standard hump-back bridge of Josias Jessop's design. So what was on the original route?

The only way to discover more was to use the excavations for construction of the foundations of the lift bridge to investigate what might remain of the original bridge below ground level. Our expert consultant archaeologists Martin Cook and Suzanne MacLeod attending the site were in luck. Careful excavation by volunteers revealed substantial remains of the canal-facing brickwork walls and discovered that the Birtley canal bridge was a swing bridge.

Despite the short time on site available for investigation it proved possible to unearth interesting – and unexpected - features of the former bridge. First, it became clear that the brickwork structure of the west abutment was supported on thick timber planks and the second unexpected discovery was an iron 'stirrup' to which was attached a short section of heavily corroded chain. The archaeologists believe that this is likely a relic of a 'Sunday chain' which would have been stretched across the canal - typically at a lock or bridge location - to discourage navigation on Sundays. In the early nineteenth century it was normal for the waterways to carry goods on all days of the week, though increasing religious piety from the 1830s onwards caused some companies to ban use of their navigations on Sundays, early converts to this regulation being river navigations in north-west England. At the time of writing it is not known if the W&A Junction Canal was subject to this restriction.

This article has shown that much new knowledge has been gleaned from excavations on what might have seemed an unpromising site; much more remains hidden along the course of the Wey & Arun Canal!

The project forms part of the Queen's Green Canopy Initiative created to mark the Platinum Jubilee 2022. The initiative will serve as a lasting tribute to Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II's extraordinary service to her country and her people. The Acting Gardens Manager at Buckingham Palace, Claire Midgley-Adam MVO was in attendance.

Friends of Shalford is a community organisation which seeks to support the local community and make good things happen in Shalford and Peasmarsh. With the support of Shalford, Chilworth and Peasmarsh Garden Club they have been working to restore the space since early 2020. Work has included removal of dead, broken and unsuitable trees, rubbish clearance and restoration of a wooden archway as a seat. A new wooden bench was funded by Great Western Railway and a grant from the NISA Making a Difference Locally Fund (MADL) was used to purchase the trees. Valuable support has also been given by the nearby Snooty's Grocery Store and Shalford Community Council.



Job 12:15 If he withholds the waters, they dry up; if he sends them out, they overwhelm the land. Job knew what he was talking about when one reflects on this year's climatic conditions, first drought, then downpours. This made conditions rather tricky to grow exhibits for our autumn show, be it flowers or vegetables. However with faith, and some skill and knowledge, wonderful results were obtained, despite the hosepipe ban. Considerable effort goes into our shows. It all begins with the Schedule (our show catalogue) designed to encourage entries from all abilities. Planning begins early in the year defining the



categories. Setting up on the eve of the show is a team effort, not without physical graft and complexity. How many exhibits, how much space per exhibit? Arranging the tables is like solving a Rubik cube. Much time goes into staging the exhibits, some entrants spending 2 hours or more arranging floral displays, or symmetrical vegetable patterns, to say nothing of the time taken to grow them (or 5 hours to bake a brioche). Marshalling requires accuracy recording results, and supreme diplomacy dealing with the judges, particularly when critical of one's own exhibits. Are we using imperial or metric measurements, are the dahlias or tomatoes in the right class? Do the vases and containers conform to size restrictions? We thank the judges by providing them with a delightful tea. It is all worthwhile the moment the show opens to the public, trophies are awarded, and prize monies are won as a reward for one's efforts. Having cleared it all away afterwards, we heave a sigh of relief, say a prayer of thanks, retire for a cleansing ale, and reflect on the satisfaction of doing a little something for the community.

On 5th December 2022, Shalford, Peasmarsh and Chilworth Garden Club are meeting at 7pm for their AGM followed by Pamela Holt's talk on French Landscape Gardens. This meeting will be held at Shalford Village Hall, UPPER Hall, Kings Rd, Shalford, Guildford, Surrey, GU4 8BQ.

Christmas Jelly Pudding

Here is a recipe for an alternative to the traditional Christmas pudding. It is much lighter, gluten free and a favourite of adults and children alike but still looks like a Christmas pudding. It also can be made in just a few minutes.

Ingredients

1 red jelly (strawberry or raspberry)

500 g mixed dried fruit (currants, sultanas, raisins etc)

2 tablespoons brandy or sherry (optional)

Method

1. Place mixed dried fruit into a pudding bowl(large enough for the fruit and with about an inch to spare at the top). Add brandy and leave to soak. Stir occasionally.

2. Make the jelly up as shown on the instructions which usually suggests - cut up the jelly into cubes and place in jug. Add 1/2 pint(285ml) of boiling water and stir until dissolved. Add 1/2 pint (285ml) of cold water and stir.

3. Pour the made up jelly into the pudding bowl to cover the dried fruit. Leave the jelly and fruit mixture to cool. Frequently stir the mixture so that the fruit becomes evenly distributed throughout and doesn't sink to the bottom. The jelly is absorbed by the fruit and plumps up, refrigerate to set.

4. When required to eat, place the pudding bowl in a bowl of warm water for a few minutes and gently run a knife around the inside of the pudding bowl and turn out the Christmas jelly pudding onto a serving plate. It should come out whole and look surprisingly like a traditional Christmas pudding.

5. Place a piece of holly on the top of the Christmas jelly pudding for decoration. Serve on its own or with cream.
